The run in 1975 was for bikes 30 years and older. You will see on the list that all participant bikes were from before WWII. The cut-off date for entries was over the years kept at 30 years . Although I managed to hold the cut-off date the last few years at 1990. There is an argument to let younger bikes enter is that some older riders cannot manage a girderfork bike any longer.

We had a record number of 170 entries this jubilee year. More than in the last 10 year. But the last tour organised by Don Liddle had 235 entries. Unfortunaly I spotted several "unregistered" participants so we might aswell had more than 200 participants ?? People being reluctant to pay the entry fee and not realising that it actually cost money to organise these event.

With the shift in year of manufacture of the bikes , the event has lost its relevance for the VMCC. Plus we have run out of volunteers willing to organise it . We also considered moving the entry date to bikes from 1970 and older. But the event has such a following that would be rude to many "oldtimers" to put a limit on. The Committee has therefor sought a solution for the tour away from the VMCC. Its is really a "Classic Motorcycle Club" event and not a Girderfork tour any longer. But none of the Classic Motorcycle Clubs I approached were willing to take it on.

Luckily we have had the support of a number of helpers in the last few years. Don Sinclair and Peter Robinson who organised routes, lunch stops and backups. Clyde Ikin who did the entries this year. And people like Rick Nabkey who makes the Happy Hour happen.

We are fortunate that Jim Scaysbrook has now volunteered to manage the Tour forward. No doubt changes will be made . And they need to be made if only to mitigate the cost of the event Head Quarter cabin. To mark the occasion of the Jubilee we had organised the auditorium at the Bathurst RSL were the Jubilee dinner was held. We packed the hall full with more than 200 diners. It was pay as you go and despite the lines the RSL did a great job getting the meals come through quickly. Everyone enjoyed a good meal aswell.

Central West in which Steph Robinson is the CEO.

This Tour has been the premier event for the VMCC in the last 50 years. This year again every participant enjoyed a wonderful number of days riding in the beautiful surrounds of Bathurst. The weather was brilliant, the routes challenging for older bikes.

Due to a developing unsafe situation at the traditional start at Ashmore Drive, we had to change the start to the parking area of the sport fields in Hereford street. Ample of space for trailers and bikes. But being Council ground we probably would have needed to apply for a permit. The coffee van had to be on the sport field side of the fence as she did not have a permit !

I was privileged to having organised the last five years of the tour and managed to get the support of more volunteers. But it is time to pass the baton.
